Exclusive interviews: Mr Rhodes and Mr Bradnum

'Rastrick's quite special in its attitude to music' This was pointed out by Rastrick high school's singing teacher, Charlie Rhodes. Here he goes on to explain that, unlike other high schools, Rastrick accepts music as part of its 'culture' and that it is not very often that music is embraced as much as it is here at Rastrick. Stephen Bradnum, the lower brass teacher, went even further to say that 'unlike other schools where music is simply a lesson in the curriculum, at Rastrick the staff get to share their love of music with students... outside of curriculum time'.

Another point made by both Stephen and Charlie is the fact that it is impossible to escape having a connection with music 'It is as vital as food or drink' (Charlie Rhodes) 'whether it be heavy metal, classical or it be choral or whether it be soundtracks...or pop...ever idiom of music is equally valuable and equally important...and it is

important to find the genre that you enjoy' (Stephen Bradnum). For them this is the reason that music is so celebrated at Rastrick high school.

So how can you get involved with the music department? First of all, anyone can get involved with junior choir (years 7 + 8) and senior choir

(years 9, 10 + 11) for free with no previous experience required, AND as a bonus, for those who attend junior choir on a regular basis have the chance to apply for FREE singing lessons with Charlie Rhodes. The school also offer private music lessons for a whole range of instruments, for more information you can visit the RHS website.

also said that they will not get involved but that will change as Russia have 'accidentally' killed two people in a farm in Poland. This could be a problem for the entire world as NATO will be forced to get involved if it is true and this could lead to a World War three. Although Russia is extremely low on troops and have had to remove some because of the weather and NATO massively outnumber them.

What have people done in protest?

You may have seen this year's Eurovision out of protest many of the public voted for Ukraine and they ended up winning by a country mile. Sadly because of Putin's wrath next year it will not take place in Ukraine and will be forced to take place in England (second place) instead.

A lot of people in Ukraine have also still been attending competitions such as Oleksander Usyk in which he won the match and him and Antony Joshua shared a Ukraine flag while waiting for the results.

These were some amazing acts of unity from Ukraine and other countries hopefully making citizens feel more supported.

<u>What can you do?</u>

Donate to charities! This is a great way to try and help suffering citizens. You can donate to charities such as UNICEF or red cross.

World Cup Controversy

Many footballers have tried to campaign against this such as the German team taking a pre-match photo showing them being gagged to replicate Qatari punishments for homosexuality. An ex Qatari footballer stated the gay people coming to visit Qatar was like a 'slap in the face' and that should be respecting their law. Harry Kane the English captain has been banned from wearing the one love captains' band and if he wears it then he will be given a yellow card.

FIFA

FIFA is notorious for being incredibly corrupt and susceptible to taking bribes from other countries. Many of the people who work as the delegates of FIFA are either in prison or facing charges against crimes they've committed while working under FIFA and some are even banned from football.



The media have released rumours that the Qatari government paid FIFA off to let them hold the world cup as countries such as America or Australia would have been much more fitting, having more stadiums hotels and airports. People wanting to see the world cup have been camping around the stadium as they don't have enough hotels.

At this rate by the end of 2100 almost half of all the worlds species will disappear from planet earth, creating one of the greatest ecological destructions known to mankind.



Are figure skaters healthy?


There are so many health benefits to it! Figure skaters are constantly training and pushing their body to the limits. You see increased strength, flexibility, and coordination.





Hungry? Quick and easy after school snacks

Are you hungry? Has it been a long day? Well, I'm going to show you 3 different recipes you can make yourself at home if you're feeling a bit peckish. Who has time to run to the shops to make something to eat. These recipes use barely any ingredients and don't use up a lot of time and effort.

Scrumptious Smoothies

This smoothie recipe is vegan friendly and super quick to make! It only contains three ingredients, and a blender is necessary.

175g strawberries1 small banana100ml orange juice, chilled

 All you have to do is place all the ingredients into a blender until smooth.
 Pour into a glass and its ready to enjoy!

Shortbread biscuits

The cooking time is 10-20 minutes and contains 20-24 biscuits. If you like you can also add chocolate chips.

-180g plain flour -55g caster sugar -125g butter (unsalted works best)

 Preheat the oven to 190C/170C fan/Gas 5
 Add both the butter and sugar to a bowl and beat until smooth.
 Add in the flour and stir until you get a smooth paste. On a lightly floured work surface gently roll out the paste until it's about 1cm thick.
 Cut out your shapes and place on a baking tray,

sprinkle with caster sugar and chill in the fridge for around 20 minutes.

5) After bake in the preheated oven for 15-20 minutes until golden-brown. Once they are out of the oven set aside on a wire rack until cool.

Perfect Pancakes

The cooking time in 20 minutes but take 10 minutes to prepare.

100g plain flour 2 eggs 300ml milk

Put the flour, milk and eggs into a bowl and whisk until smooth.
 Put a medium frying pan over medium heat and carefully wipe it with some oiled kitchen paper.
 When hot put some mixture into the pan and cook for one min on each side until golden.
 Serve either with some lemon wedges (optional) if you want.

- 3. Combine into a ball.
- 4. Knead briefly.
- 1. Heat oven to 200 degrees.
- 2. Line 18 holes of baking tray.
- 3. Press balls of dough into each hole.
- 4. Spoon in mincemeat.
- 5. Make lids out of remaining pastry. Cover each pie.
- 6. Press edges to seal.
- 7. Brush top of each pie with egg.
- 8. Bake for 20 minutes.
- 9. Dust with icing sugar and enjoy!

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
